FNHSSM 10 week Anti-Indigenous training seeks to address systemic racism in healthcare, through the interruption of knowledge transfer from preceptors to trainees.

This training is for health care professionals who want to disrupt racism in health care and want to expand their scope of practice to include anti-racism engagment and practice in their work.

Training covers the following topics;

- Learning about colonialism and it's effects on Indigenous health
- Use of reflexivity as a mode of recognizing bias and stereotypes
- Sharing of tools that can be used to address and combat racism.






The Team undertakes this work without fiscal support and remains committed to the delivery and success of this training to help address the ongoing harms First Nations face when interacting and navigating the violent health care systems in our region.

## TARGET AUDIENCE

Health care professionals who want to eliminate and confront racism and integrate anti-Indigenous racism principles into their scope of practice.

## Our goals are to:

- Expand health care professionals' cultural competency in their practice by understanding of the ongoing colonial effects on First Nations Health;
- Use reflexivity to recognize stereotyping; and
- Share tools that can be used to address and combat stereotyping in the field.

### TRAINING DELIVERY

- 10 week training that includes Orientation and Closing Circle
- 4-6 trainees are paired with 2-3 FNHSSM Anti-Racism
   Trainers
- 1 hour hybrid discussionbased format
- 1 hour of reading each week outside of discussion
- The assigned reading will lead discussion the following week
- Interactive Anti-Racism activities

### TRAINING OBJECTIVES

- Create an understanding of the levels of First Nation-specific racism within a "Canadian" context.
- Articulate ways that self knowledge can improve health outcomes for First Nation patients.
- Create an understanding of white/settler power and privilege.
- Design interventions to address First Nation-specific racism in their practice.
- Employing First Nations art, stories and other mediums to facilitate change.
- Increase confidence to address and call out racism.
